#### Rhododendron & Azalea Care

Paying attention to a few simple guidelines when choosing and planting this group will reward you with years of beauty.

 Rhododendrons and Azaleas prefer moist, well drained soil that is high in humus, and acidic. Inadequate drainage is the #1 killer of Rhododendrons and Azaleas. A preferable site is one that is slightly shaded out of the way of strong winter winds and the hot afternoon sun.



- The fine silk-like root structure tends to stay very near the surface and resents disturbances. Light mulching is beneficial.
- Loose open materials such as pine bark make an ideal mulch for Rhododendrons and Azaleas.
- Due to their root structure, pot grown varieties can become so thick and matted that the roots on them must be cut. Vertical slits with a knife will ensure good root to soil contact.
- New transplants should be monitored carefully so that they are neither too
  wet not too dry.
- Height varies depending on the cultivar. In general Azaleas tend to be smaller. All flower in the spring.
   Dwarf Rhododendron- early to mid April
   PJM Rhododendron- early to mid April
   Azaleas- April to May
   Rhododendrons- May-June

# There are five main groups of Rhododendrons and Azaleas.

- 1. Large Evergreen Rhododendron
- 2. Small Evergreen Rhododendron
- 3. Viveya
- 4. Deciduous Azalea
- 5. Evergreen Azalea

## Groups 1 & 2 Small and Large Evergreen Rhododendron

- Some cultivars develop a silvery woolly covering on new leaves which disappears with age.
- Small leaf varieties are slightly more tolerant to sun exposure.
- Flowers may be white, pink, red, lilac, yellow or purple.
- Largest cultivars can reach 8'-10' tall and 6-'-8' wide.
- Smallest cultivars only reach 18" tall and 18"-24" wide.
- Not all varieties are hardy in Zone 5.
- Be sure to ask your Garden Center Professional for assistance.

# **Group 3 -Viveya**

• This group is not hardy in our Zone 5.

### **Group 4 -Deciduous Azalea**

- Flower colors include red, orange, yellow, pink, white, and bi-colors.
- Flowers may be single or double.
- Some varieties have fragrant flowers.
- Sizes may range from 3'-5' tall to 2'-4 wide.
- Not all varieties are hardy in zone 5. Be sure to ask your Garden Center Professional for assistance.

### **Group 5- Evergreen Azalea**

- Flower colors include red, fuschia, purple, white and pink.
- Flowers may be single or double.
- Sizes may vary from 3'-5' tall and wide.
- Slightly more tolerant to sun exposure.
- Not all varieties are hardy in Zone 5. Some varieties may be semi-evergreen in Zone 5.
- Be sure to ask your Garden Center Professional for assistance.
